4 As Protocol: Creating Meaningful Dialogue

Purpose: This protocol is intended to raise a variety of perspectives about a topic, experience, or new learning. It is important to listen to understand and to look at the topic or learning from different points of view. We will use this protocol to unpack chapter 1 of Glenn Singleton's Courageous Conversations.

Take a few minutes to review your notes and to highlight some ideas that were interesting, challenging, and thought-provoking (2 minutes).

- 1. Select a facilitator for your table who will monitor time and move the conversation through the 4 A's (1 minute).
- 2. As a table group, focus your conversation on what were the underlying ASSUMPTIONS of what you learned (10 minutes)
- 3. Move the conversation on to ideas that you AGREE with (10 minutes).
- 4. Bring closure to your group's dialogue by identifying ideas from the reading that you would ASPIRE TO APPLY (10 minutes).

Norms for Dialogue

- Ensure that all voices are heard.
- Be respectful of diverse perspectives and points of view
- Listen to understand.
